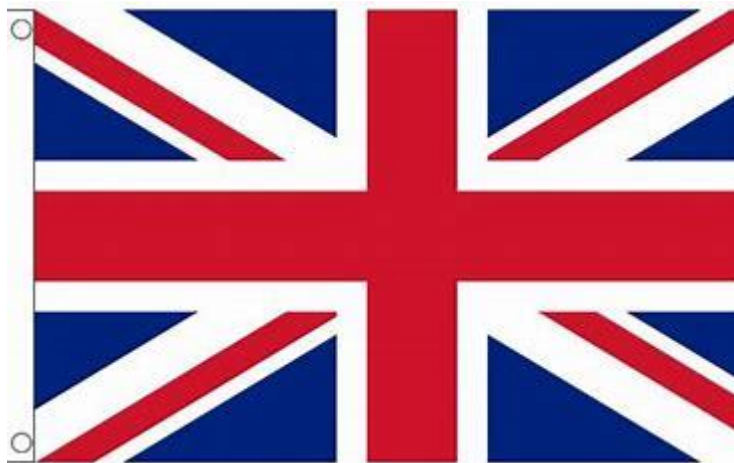

IWYS - Alternative Provision– British Values Statement

At IWYS - Alternative Provision we ensure that through our vision, values, rules, curriculum and teaching we promote tolerance and respect for all cultures, faiths and lifestyles. We have a duty to prepare our children for life in modern Britain and to keep them safe. As a Provision we value the diverse ethnic backgrounds of all pupils and families; we undertake a variety of events and lessons to celebrate these. We have found this approach to be enriching for all parties as it teaches tolerance and respect for the differences in our community and the wider world. Underpinning all this are a range of curriculum topics which have strong links to British History

This statement outlines the key British values we actively promote.

General overview

IWYS - Alternative Provision is committed to serving its community and surrounding areas. We recognise the multi-cultural, multi-faith nature of the United Kingdom and understand the crucial role our Provision plays in promoting these values.

Through our provision we:

- enable students to develop their self-knowledge, self-esteem and self-confidence.
- enable students to distinguish right from wrong and to respect the civil and criminal law of England.
- encourage students to accept responsibility for their behaviour, show initiative, and to understand how they can contribute positively to the lives of those living and working in the locality of the school and to society more widely;
- enable students to acquire a broad general knowledge of and respect for public institutions and services in England;
- further tolerance and harmony between different cultural traditions by enabling students to acquire an appreciation of and respect for their own and other cultures;
- encourage respect for other people; and
- encourage respect for democracy and support for participation in the democratic processes, including respect for the basis on which the law is made and applied in England
- promote an understanding of how citizens can influence decision-making through the democratic process;
- encourage an appreciation that living under the rule of law protects individual citizens and is essential for their wellbeing and safety.
- promote an understanding that there is a separation of power between the executive and the judiciary, and that while some public bodies such as the police and the army can be held to account through Parliament, others such as the courts maintain independence.
- teach an understanding that the freedom to choose and hold other faiths and beliefs is protected in law.
- encourage acceptance that other people having different faiths or beliefs to oneself (or having none) should be accepted and tolerated and should not be the cause of prejudicial or discriminatory behaviour; and teach an understanding of the importance of identifying and combatting discrimination.

Democracy

To understand how they can influence decision making through a democratic process.

We empower our pupils by giving them opportunities to make choices about the things that they believe to be important. By valuing each 'voice' and by listening and responding to that voice we demonstrate that we support democracy and liberty.

The principle of democracy is also explored as part of our curriculum as well as in student discussions. We explore how democracy, and the law works in Britain in contrast to other forms of government in other countries.

Individual Liberty

To understand that the freedom to choose is protected in law.

Pupils are actively encouraged to make choices, knowing that they are in a safe and supportive environment.

We educate and provide boundaries for pupils to make choices safely, through provision of a safe environment and an empowering education.

Pupils are encouraged to know, understand and exercise their rights and personal freedoms and advise how to exercise these safely, for example through our E-Safety and PSHE lessons.

Whether it is through choice of challenge, of how they record, choose their lunch options, of participation in and opportunities etc., pupils are given the freedom to make choices.

Mutual Respect

To understand that while people may hold different views, we may show respect towards them.

Part of our ethos and behaviour policy revolves around core values such as 'Respect'. Pupils have been part of discussions related to what this means and how it is shown. These ideas are reiterated through IWYS Alternative provision and classroom rules.

Our curriculum embodies values of Mutual Respect through our units of learning.

On a general level, IWYS Alternative Provision upholds traditional values of empathy, respect and tolerance during PSHE lessons and on an informal nature throughout the IWYS days.

The Rule of Law

To appreciate that living under the rule of law protects us and is essential for our wellbeing and safety.

The importance of laws, whether they be those that govern the class, the IWYS Alternative Provision, or the country, are consistently reinforced throughout regular days and when dealing with behaviour.

Pupils are taught the value and reasons behind laws; that they govern and protect us; the responsibilities that they hold and the consequences when laws are broken. We will aim to invite visits from authorities such as the Police; Fire Service; Ambulance, etc when possible, to help us reinforce this message.
